FOREWORD

THESE additions and corrections cover only certain fields of the parent work which was published in 1947 in two volumes. All new titles are carefully entered and described, although only nine such titles have been discovered in the last thirteen years. Only unique issues acquired by libraries have been entered. Certain libraries, like the Library of Congress, the New York libraries, and especially the American Antiquarian Society, have acquired thousands of issues in the past few years, but these are all in long or complete files and generally are not mentioned. Libraries which have sent me lists of issues recently obtained should note this fact and not expect to find all copies listed. In a few cases long files acquired by libraries have been entered, on the assumption that they might contain a few issues not in the supposedly complete files in other libraries. New biographical facts concerning publishers, printers, and editors are entered. Frequently, the complete spellings of Christian names hitherto known only by initials are given. Important changes in the historical accounts of newspapers

have been entered. Most of these changes have been obtained through correspondence, or by noting the record of additions in printed reports or bulletins of libraries. There has been no attempt to visit the many libraries to re-examine the various files. Microfilm reproductions issued by various libraries in the past few years have been noted, although not the many libraries purchasing such microfilm files.

Soc. has July 1-22, Aug. 5, Sept. 2-Oct. 21, Nov. 4, 18, 25, Dec. 9-23, 1807; Jan. 13-27, Feb. 10-24, 1808.

[**Norwich**] **Native American**. The last issue was published on June 23, 1813, No. 68, in which issue Webb announced that he had been called into war service. Am. Antiq. Soc. has June 3, 1812, transferred from Yale; also June 23, 1813. N.Y. Pub. Lib. has May 29, 1795, not 1775.

The publisher states that the Gazette "will commence on the first day of October next" (photostat in Am. Antiq. Soc.). No regular issue has been located.

[Washington] **National Intelligencer.** Lib. Congress has issued a microfilm of this paper from 1800 to after 1820, which film is in several libraries.

[Augusta] **Georgia State Gazette.** Am. Antiq. Soc. has Jan. 25, May 16, July 11, 1804. Lib. Congress made a microfilm of Oct. 14, 1786-Apr. 4, 1789, which is in several libraries.

[Louisville] **American Standard.** This paper is referred to as the "Louisville Standard" in the Philadelphia "Aurora" of Dec. 31, 1812.

Louisville Gazette. Delete first fifteen lines, and read: "Weekly Established Jan. 22, 1799, by Ambrose Day, with the title of 'The Louisville Gazette.' Beginning with the issue of Apr. 29, 1800, the paper was published by Ambrose Day and James Hely, and the title was changed to 'Louisville Gazette and Republican Trumpet.' The paper was so continued certainly to June 29, 1803, vol. 5, no.

204. After an apparent suspension of two months, judging from the volume numbering, and a publisher's announcement, the paper was re-established on Nov. 19, 1803," etc. Univ. of Ga. has Jan. 22, 1799-June 29, 1803.

Waldo with the title of "The State Gazette, and Louisville Journal." Waldo continued to publish the paper certainly through Dec. 24, 1799, vol. 2, no. 57. When on a visit to Charleston, he died July 25, 1801, according to a notice in the Charleston "Times" of July 27, 1801. The "Waldo Genealogy," 1883, p. 119, in recording the date of his death, refers to him as "being at the time State Printer of Georgia," but I find no record of this. [**Milledgeville**] **Georgia Republican**. The only issue located is that of Sept. 28, 1819, vol. 1, no. 3, published by Jones and Denison, with the title of "Georgia Republican." Am. Antiq. Soc. has Sept. 28, 1819.

[**Petersburg**] **Georgia & Carolina Gazette**, 1805-1807. Weekly. Established June 8, 1805, by Michael Burke and Alexander M'Donnell, with the title of "Georgia & Carolina Gazette." With the issue of Jan. 2, 1806, Alexander M'Donnell became sole publisher and continued the paper to the last issue located, Aug. 7, 1806, vol. 2, no. 55. Univ. of Ga., Athens, has June 15, July 18-Aug. 1, 15-29, Sept. 12, 28, Oct. 5, 24, Nov. 23-Dec. 14, 1805; Jan. 30, Mar. 4, June 5, July 24-Aug. 7, 1806. Soc., says that Michael Pinkind advertised in the "Republican Star" of Sept. 1, 1807, that he planned to establish "The People's Monitor" later in the year, but died Dec. 26, 1807, before he accomplished his purpose. Harrison also says that the paper was discontinued in December 1817, since the "Easton Gazette" of Dec. 15, 1817, published Rowleson's valedictory. The "Republican Star" of Sept. 17, 1816, and Sept. 30, 1817, contain references to "The People's Monitor." Am. Antiq. Soc. has May 26, 1810.

MASSACHUSETTS

[Boston] **American Gazette**, 1778. This is a single leaf of two printed pages and purports to be "The American Gazette" of Apr. 2, 1778, printed at Boston by Humphrey Humbug. It carries a volume numbering of no. 4545, and was "Published by Authority of the Congress." The news, documents printed, and advertisements are all of a false or burlesque nature, ridiculing the patriot cause. Although allegedly published at Boston, there is little doubt that this so-called newspaper was conceived and published in London. The size, twelve by seven inches, the format and the heading

exactly follow "The London Gazette," the references to Revolutionary personages are almost all to English statesmen, and the imitation red revenue stamp follows that impressed on English newspapers, and, in no case on American journals. Am. Antiq. Soc. has Apr. 2, 1778.

Southwick replied in a Handbill dated March 13, 1779, no copy located. Carter in the "Providence Gazette" of March 13, 1779, says that the first edition of the Handbill was "smothered in its Birth," and that the whole impression was "unfortunately lost"; also that the "second Edition, with Omissions, Additions and Emendations, is to be carefully concealed till after the Publication of this Day's Gazette." Perhaps the first edition was destroyed and the second never printed. Carter, in his "Gazette" of March 20, 1779, addressed a long reply "To Solomon Southwick." In this article Carter said that in the Handbill it was stated that Carter had completed as much of the "public work" in "four weeks," on an average, as Southwick had in "fourteen months." Southwick in a Supplement to the "American Journal," no. 3, not dated but following the issue of April 1, 1779, no. 3 (copy in Am. Antiq. Soc.), gave nearly

two pages to a reply to Carter. In this he states with reference to the comparative speed of the two offices that he did not use the phrase "public work." Am. Antiq. [**Nashville**] **Clarion**. Howard-Tilton Lib. has Nov. 29, 1814; Feb. 21, Mar. 7, 1815. A microfilm has been issued of this paper from 1810 to 1820, positives of which are in Am. Antiq. Soc. and other libraries.

[**Nashville**] **Tennessee Gazette**. The issue of Dec. 5, 1804, states that the editor has been absent for some months, leaving the paper in the care of his brother, John M. [**Winchester**] **Virginia Gazette.** A broadside "Proposals" was issued by Henry Willcocks, dated Jan. 1, 1787.
