

## *Report of the Treasurer*

WITH THE COMPLETION of our recent fiscal year and the submission of the Society's audited financial statements by Love, Bollus, Lynch & Rogers, our independently engaged certified public accounting firm, I am pleased to report the following financial highlights.

The Society's total assets increased by nearly \$700,000 from \$28,512,214 to \$29,201,227.

Our net asset position, or net equity, or the difference between total assets and total liabilities, was a healthy \$29,024,636, compared to a similar level of \$27,028,791 in 1994.

Overall expenses were \$2,615,247, compared to \$2,459,904 of a year ago—an increase in part caused by increased collection purchases.

Market value of our investment portfolio at fiscal year end was \$29,597,473, compared to \$26,129,380 one year ago—an effective spread of nearly \$3,500,000.

Our Finance Committee oversees the investment of our portfolio and is composed of the following members: Karl Briel, John G. L. Cabot, James C. Donnelly, Jr., Henry S. Streeter, Sumner B. Tilton, Jr., John M. Woolsey, Jr., and the undersigned, with Robert Baron and Ellen Dunlap *ex officiiis*.

On balance, fiscal 1995 was a successful year, and the American Antiquarian Society enjoys a strong and healthy financial position. We appreciate the continuous efforts of Ellen Dunlap and her entire staff to manage the budget of the Society so carefully and effectively.

I am also pleased to note that our auditors rendered a 'clean' opinion with respect to our annual financial statements and that such financial statements reflect early adoption of two significant not-for-profit accounting pronouncements, FASB's 116 and 117.

On behalf of the Finance Committee, I would like to express our sincere thanks to all members who have contributed to the Society. The assistance of all contributing members is deeply valued and appreciated.

## NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### 1. *Summary of Significant Accounting Policies*

**Organization**—The American Antiquarian Society supports and maintains a research library of American history and culture. To this end, it collects, organizes, preserves, and makes available for use printed and manuscript materials dating principally from 1639 to 1876. In addition, the Society provides educational programs, offers research fellowships, and produces scholarly publications.

**Method of accounting**—The financial statements of The American Antiquarian Society have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. Accordingly, assets are recorded when the Society obtains the rights of ownership or is entitled to claims for receipt and liabilities are recorded when the obligation is incurred.

**Financial statement presentation**—In 1995, the Society adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Organizations." SFAS No. 117 requires that the Society present information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classifications of net assets described as follows:

**Unrestricted**—All resources over which the governing board has discretionary control. The governing board of the Society may elect to designate such resources for specific purposes. This designation may be removed at the board's discretion.

**Temporarily Restricted**—Resources accumulated through donations or grants for specific operating or capital purposes. Such resources will become unrestricted when the requirements of the donor or grantee have been satisfied through expenditure for the specified purpose or program or through the passage of time.

**Permanently Restricted**—Endowment resources accumulated through donations or grants that are subject to the restriction in perpetuity that the principal be invested. Investment income may be either an unrestricted or temporarily restricted resource when earned, determined according to the gift instruments.

As permitted by SFAS No. 117, the Society has not reclassified its 1994 financial statements to present the three classifications of net assets required.

**Cash equivalents**—For purposes of these financial statements, the Society considers all unrestricted and undesignated money market funds and highly liquid debt instruments with original maturities of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

*Notes to financial statements (contd.)*

*Pledges*—Pledges are recorded as receivables in the year the pledge is made. Pledges for support of current operations are recorded as unrestricted support. Pledges for support of future operations, plant asset acquisitions, and endowment are recorded as temporarily restricted or permanently restricted support.

*Property, plant, and equipment*—Property, plant, and equipment are carried at cost or at fair market value at date of gift. Depreciation is computed using straight-line and accelerated methods.

*Investments*—Investments are carried at cost. Gains or losses recognized on the sale of such investments are based on the specific identification method and are accounted for in the appropriate class of net assets.

*Collection*—In conformity with the current practice followed by many nonprofit organizations, items of historical nature and other collection objects purchased or donated are not included in the balance sheet. Gifts of cash or other property restricted by donors for the purchase of items for the collection are classified as temporarily restricted net assets until acquisitions or restorations are made in accordance with the terms of the gift.

*Contributions, gifts, grants*—During 1995, the Society adopted Statement of Financial Accounting Standards (SFAS) No. 116, "Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made." SFAS No. 116 requires that contributions received are to be recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and nature of any donor restrictions. Contributions may include gifts of cash, collection items, or promises to give. Such contributions are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor or grantor. Contribution of assets other than cash are recorded at their fair value on the date of the gift. Restricted gifts or promises to give are required to be reported as restricted support in the period received and are then reclassified to unrestricted net assets upon satisfaction of the donor restriction.

As allowed by SFAS No. 116, the Society has elected not to restate prior period financial statements but has recorded the effect of adoption as a cumulative effect of a change in accounting principle. The cumulative effect of \$1,347,255 represents unrestricted support, time and purpose restricted support, and permanently restricted pledges previously recorded as deferred revenue.

6. Retirement Plan

The Society has a defined contribution pension plan which covers all eligible employees. The Plan is funded on a current basis and is administered by Teachers Insurance Annuity Association-College Retirement Equities Fund (TIAA-CREF). Pension expense was \$59,227 and \$58,543 in 1995 and 1994, respectively.

*9. Tax-Exempt Status*

The Society qualifies as a tax-exempt, not-for-profit organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Accordingly, no provision for income tax is required.

*10. Reclassifications*

Certain amounts in the 1994 financial statements have been reclassified to conform with the 1995 presentation. Such reclassifications had no effect on change in net assets as previously reported.

Statement of Financial Accounting Standards No. 116, "Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made" and No. 117, "Financial Statements of Not-For-Profit Organizations".
