Charles Francis Adams, member of the Massachusetts Legislature, leader of the "Conscience Whigs," "Free Soil" leader, member of Congress, Minister to England during the Civil War, Arbitrator for the United States at the Geneva Conference. Since Colonial times members of the Adams family have occupied positions of great distinction and have a record of public service unequaled in this country and in England.

LUCIEN CARR.

Lucien Carr was born in Troy, Mo., December 15, 1829, and died in Cambridge, Mass., January 27, 1915. He was graduated from St. Louis University in 1846, receiving the degree of A. B. which was followed by that of A. M. For many years he was occupied with historical studies and in 1877 was made assistant curator of the Peabody Museum of American Archaeology and Ethnology at Harvard, remaining there till 1894, when he resigned and has since been engaged in writing on scientific subjects. He was author of "The Mounds of the Mississippi Valley, Historically Considered." "Missouri." in the American Commonwealth's series and "Prehistoric Remains of Kentucky" (with the late Prof. N. S. Shaler). was a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, of the Massachusetts Historical Society. of the Missouri Historical Society, and of the Anthropological Societies of Paris, London, Moscow and Washington. He was elected to this Society in 1886, and contributed to its Proceedings these papers: "The Food of Certain American Indians and their Methods of Preparing It" (April, 1895), "Dress and Ornaments of Certain American Indians" (April, 1897), and "The Mascoutins" (April, 1900). He also made many gifts to the Library. He married Miss Cornelia L. Crow, who with two children survives him.
